
Pulse Oximeter

Measures the amount of oxygen in the blood

When a person overdoses, their breathing slows/stops and they do not have enough oxygen in their blood. Using a pulse oximeter can help tell IF and WHEN a person needs Narcan.

On/Off Button SE OXIMET



Pulse - Beats per Minute

Reading the Pulse Ox (%SpO2)

<u>Above 96%</u> No Narcan! 89% - 95%

Check for signs of an overdose

Place person in the recovery position

Stay with the person and continue to check their pulse ox



Below 89% Give Narcan Call 911



After Narcan is given place person in recovery position

Best Practices:

- <u>A pulse ox is not 100% right, always check for other signs of an</u> <u>overdose! If individual stays unresponsive, call 911!</u>
- Use the middle or ring finger as they are least likely to be calloused
- Black or darker skin can cause higher read on the pulse ox.
- Nail polish can also impact how well the pulse ox works.
